



## CHECKLIST

### Basic Household and Dwelling information you need to complete the Métis Nation of Ontario (MNO) Housing Census

(If you have this information before hand, completing the Census is likely to go much faster!)

**1. You will need to know the following information to respond to questions being asked of everyone:**

- Your contact information as the person filling out the Census form: email address; street address; phone number.
- How many Citizens and non-Citizens are living in your household.
- Their ages as of today's date.
- Whether you and/or your household members have faced barriers to obtaining a secure place to live.
- Type of construction and numbers of rooms in your home.
- Your approximate monthly and annual costs of housing right now.
- Your approximate household income right now.

*All of the above questions are being asked on a strictly confidential basis and responses are stored on Secure Data Servers. The above personal information will be used to confirm you are a citizen of the Métis Nation of Ontario. Prior to any analysis, the dataset will be made anonymous so your name, birthdate, contact information, and citizen registration number will all be removed. (Only grouped data for many households will appear in communications or reports).*

**2. To reduce the load on all Métis Nation of Ontario households, a smaller proportion are being asked about three very important topics needed for future MNO program planning and implementation. The kinds of information required for each topic are provided here. While you will only be asked about one topic, the results from everyone will be very interesting to learn about and act on in future!**

**2.1 *Information for Questions Being Asked of a Smaller Number of Households on Home Renovation and Repair:***

- What (if any) kinds of repairs or renovations your home requires to improve its safety and comfort, and what repairs or renovations you have already done, e.g., new windows.
- Your sources of funding support for doing home repairs and renovations, e.g., government subsidy programs.
- How easy or difficult it was to find someone to do repairs or renovations, or to get materials, equipment, etc. to do it yourself.

**2.2 *Information for Questions Being Asked of a Smaller Number of households on Home Safety and Adaptations for Occupants with Disabilities:***

- Types of health and safety issues you face at present in your home.
- Whether emergency services are available, e.g., in case of a fire in your home.
- Whether your home is in a place that has hazards such as flooding that need to be addressed to keep your household safe and healthy.
- Whether some basic safety devices such as smoke detectors are present in your home.
- Whether your home is adapted to assist in safe daily activities by those with different disabilities.

**2.3 *Information for Questions Being Asked of a Smaller Sample on Availability of Basic Community Services in Support of Housing:***

- What kinds of community services to housing are available near where you live, e.g., recreation centres.
- What kinds of services to occupants of your home are available, e.g., delivery from stores and mail-order warehouses.
