Apatisiwin delivers employment, education and career exploration services to Indigenous people across the life cycle. The program supports creating job opportunities, training, workshops and skills enhancements, and other activities that will improve outcomes for urban Indigenous people and reduce the employment, earnings and skills gaps that exist between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.

DIRECT OR LOCAL DELIVERY MECHANISM (LDM)

Local Delivery Mechanism.

The OFIFC holds the ISET agreement and distributes funding and other supports to sub-agreement holders across Ontario. These sub-agreement holders administer the Apatisiwin program to urban Indigenous communities; 29 of these are through Friendship Centres and 3 are Delivery Sites.

7 of the Apatisiwin sites are also connected with the Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound (UIHB) program with provides single Indigenous mothers with dedicated life skills, childcare, and education-to-employment supports through a four-year curriculum. The UIHB is offered in Dryden, Fort Erie, Hamilton, London, Niagara-on-the-Lake, Peterborough, and Sault Ste. Marie.

LOCAL DELIVERY MECHANISM INFORMATION (IF APPLICABLE)

Each Apatisiwin site delivers the same programs and services. 7 of the Apatisiwin sites are connected with the

Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound Program (UIHB) which is an employment program for single Indigenous mothers. The Apatisiwin sites that work in collaboration with UIHB are located in the following cities: Sault Ste. Marie, Dryden, Peterborough, Hamilton, London, Niagara-on-the-Lake, and Fort Erie.






